



# **High School Graduation Guide For Private School Students**

# Graduation Requirements

Overseeing the education of a student is an important task that should not be taken lightly at any stage. The high school years are the ones that will follow a person throughout his or her life. These words are not intended to strike fear in the hearts of parents or students but to emphasize the necessity to:

- 1) Understand the requirements
- 2) Develop a plan
- 3) Review that plan yearly
- 4) And Execute that plan with rigor

High school credits in Florida are awarded on the basis of half credit for passing a semester of unit work. Wellmont Academy follows the Florida standard that 68 seat hours of instruction of academic content earns one half credit. For most students, this is done over 90 days in a semester. There are courses and subject areas that are specifically required for graduation, including the total number of credits which are detailed in this guide. There shall be no substitution or waiver of these requirements for any student except as provided under the alternative programs for graduation or upon written statement from a licensed physician certifying that the course will be physically or mentally harmful to the student.

The normal timeline for high school graduation is four years, the details of which are explained below. Some students are enrolled in high school for more than the traditional four years. Graduation requirements change based on the option taken (Standard track, College Prep track, etc.) and when a student enters high school.

\*Credits below a “C” in core academic areas are not accepted for credit toward standard high school graduation or promotion to subsequent grades by Wellmont Academy enrolled students. The exception to this policy is based on the student demonstrating mastery in that core subject area by earning a letter grade of “C” or higher in a sequential course.

The demonstrating mastery exception does not apply to the “College Preparatory” graduation track. For that designation all core courses must have a grade of “C” or higher.

In addition to the standard core course requirements, Wellmont Academy high school students are required to complete a Bible class each year. Students will receive one elective credit each year for these courses.

**Wellmont accepts the following as approved “at home” curriculum.**

Abeka, BJU Press, FLVS, Mr. D Math, Saxon Math, Math U See, Chalkdust

Private School Student must provide adequate documentation to receive credit. Student must provide tests and completed work to receive credit for a course at home. Semester checks will be done to ensure student is progressing at the correct pace. If a student would like to use a different curriculum at home that is not listed, it must be presented to the Upper Level Director before the start of the class.

## Dual Enrollment

Wellmont Academy Partners with **Saint Petersburg College** for high school students to earn college credit while in high school. The link below outlines the approved classes by the college and the credit equivalencies for high school credit.

If a private school student is interested in dual enrollment, they must be 15 years of age and in good academic standing with Wellmont Academy. Below, are the steps to register:

- Student meets with Guidance Counselor to speak to speak about college classes and what that means as far as homework load and to determine how many classes would be a good fit for the student.
- Parent applies to SPC to obtain a student number from SPC directly from their website: <https://my.spcollege.edu/psp/ps/APPLICATIONCENTER/EMPL/h/?tab=APPS>
- Parent emails student number to Guidance Counselor and instructs their student to come by the office to receive a pink testing card.
- Student takes pink card to SPC to take their PERT test.
- Based on their PERT scores, student meets with Guidance Counselor to pick classes and to fill out an SPC authorization form.
- Guidance Counselor emails the authorization form to the dual enrollment office.
- Once registration opens, parents calls to sign up student for the class sections that work in their schedule.
- Once semester is completed, student sends an unofficial transcript to the guidance counselor, so the student’s transcript can be reflected.

# FLVS

Wellmont Academy recognizes **Florida Virtual School (FLVS)** as an approved source for high school students to earn high school credit. The following steps must be completed in order to become an FLVS student:

- Student meets with guidance counselor to review what classes are needed for the student.
- Parent applies to FLVS via their website. Parent must choose our school as their school of choice and the option of FLVS Flex Student. <https://flvs.net/>
- Parent enrolls student into proper course through the FLVS website.
- Guidance Counselor receives email from FLVS and approves enrollment via the FLVS website.
- Student completes class as directed by FLVS.
- Guidance counselor receives email with the notification that the course is complete, retrieves the transcript via the FLVS website, updates student's transcript and archives the course in FLVS.

## Earning Credits in Middle School

Middle school students can take a limited number of high school courses for high school credit while in middle school. Those courses are limited to the core subject areas of Mathematics, Science, and Foreign Language.

In the event a middle school student does not do well in the high school course earning a grade of "C", "D", or "F", the school's grade forgiveness policy allows the replacement of the grade with a grade of "C" or higher, earned subsequently in the same or comparable course. \*\*These courses have prerequisites that need to be met.

# Bright Futures Eligibility

## Initial Eligibility (FAS or FMS):

Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) award or the Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:

- Graduate high school from a Florida public high school with a Florida Standard Diploma (high school graduation requirements), graduate from a registered Florida Department of Education private high school, earn a GED, complete a Home Education program, or graduate from a non-Florida high school (OOS);
- Complete the required high school coursework;
- Achieve the required minimum high school grade point average (GPA);
- Achieve the required minimum score on either the ACT or SAT college entrance exam;
- Complete the required number of service hours.

# Scholarship Award Information

## Service Hours:

Students must complete volunteer service hours during high school and by high school graduation. Service hours may include, but are not limited to, a business or governmental internship, work for a nonprofit community service organization, or activities on behalf of a candidate for public office. The hours must be documented in writing, and signed by the student, the student's parent or guardian, and a representative of the organization. Each public school district and private school establishes approved activities and the process for documentation of service hours.

## Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV):

The Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) can only be used to fund a career education or certificate program. Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:

- Meet the General Requirements for Bright Futures;
- Achieve the required weighted minimum 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses;
- Take at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education Program;
- Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the career education courses;
- Achieve the required minimum score on the ACT, SAT, or Florida Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (P.E.R.T.) exams (see table below);
- Complete 30 service hours.

### College Entrance Exams

Exam types cannot be combined; a student must qualify based on each sub-test score for a single exam type. Sub-test scores from different test dates may be used to meet the test requirement. Scores taken through June 30 of the student's senior year (for a regular graduate, or January 31 for a mid year graduate) will be accepted for Bright Futures evaluation. There is no limit to the number of times a student may retake the test prior to June 30 of the student's graduation year. Request test scores to be sent to one of Florida's 12 state universities, Florida state colleges (public community colleges), or public high schools when the student registers for the ACT/SAT so that the test scores will be sent to the FDOE repository.
